Due to the nature of the Early Years Foundation Stage, these activities may change due to the interests of the children.

Understanding the world

Look around the school's grounds for minibeasts in the outdoor area – note their habitat and their behaviour.

Use magnifying glasses to get a closer look at minibeasts

Compare the different minibeasts and find ways of grouping them.

Understand the needs of small animals.

Look at different features of creatures.

Lifecycle of Butterfly and a frog.

Small world minibeast area/garden centre

Learn to identify a variety of minibeasts. How many legs do they have?

Where do they live? What do they eat? How do they move?

Take photos of the insects we find and write about them.

RE -

Personal, Social and Emotional

Worry Monster

How can we care for minibeasts and our environment? Learn about the needs of small animals and treat them accordingly.

Discuss why some people are frightened of minibeasts and learn how to overcome these fears.

Discuss the consequences of 'the bad tempered ladybird' behaviour and relate to their own experiences.

Communication and Language

Questions for children to vote then work out which answer has the most/least answers.

Developing vocabulary around minibeasts/gardens and the outdoors.

Minibeast walk – learning about prepositions (under, on top) Using a variety of language to express their thoughts.

Listen to a story about minibeasts and recall some information.

New language: chrysalis, compost, insects, minibeasts, worm casts.

Think of words to describe the minibeasts.

Summer

We will have some transition days this term, to give your children a chance to get to know their new classroom, new teachers and new friends in class. We will do everything we can to support each child to have a smooth transition into year 1.
